

Statement by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Belarus

1 June 1998

The Republic of Belarus has received the news of the nuclear tests conducted by India and Pakistan with alarm and concern. This series of nuclear tests is provoking the spread of nuclear weapons in the world on the threshold of the twenty-first century, constitutes a new spiral in the nuclear arms race, and creates considerable additional difficulties for further nuclear arms reductions.

These events run counter to the consistent efforts of the world community to strengthen the nuclear non-proliferation regime at the global and regional level which is vital for international stability and security.

The Republic of Belarus, which made the historical decision several years ago to renounce its own nuclear potential and which is a party to a number of very important agreements in the filed of nuclear disarmament, cannot but feel particular concern and alarm at this turn of events.

The Republic of Belarus calls on all countries which have not acceded to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons and which have military nuclear programmes to review their present nuclear policy, accede to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons and the Comprehensive Nuclear-Test-Ban Treaty and work towards a cut-off treaty, which will all help realize mankind's hopes for a non-nuclear world in the twenty-first century.

The events of the past few days have intensified our fears of a possible chain reaction of nuclear proliferation not just in the South Asia region but beyond. The absence of any legal obligations to the international community opens the way for this.

The Republic of Belarus, it will be recalled, in line with its consistent anti-nuclear policy and because of its concern for future generations for the fate of the European continent and for the fate of the world as a whole, has urged, and continues to urge, all countries, in the light of today's realities, to support the idea of creating a nuclear-weapon-free zone in Central and Eastern Europe.

The Republic of Belarus is convinced that realization of this goal will strengthen security and trust on the continent, will reinforce the geographical non-proliferation of nuclear weapons and will be an important step towards further consolidation of peace and stability in Europe and the world as a whole.

We believe that all countries not possessing nuclear weapons could assume formal commitments renouncing the deployment of nuclear weapons on their territory.

The Republic of Belarus appeals to the nuclear powers to undertake never under any circumstances to deploy nuclear weapons on the territory of countries not possessing such weapons.
